

I was a member for 25 years and later chaired for 3 years the Load Analytics Technical Committee of the Association of Edison Illuminating Companies' (AEIC). The AEIC was founded by Thomas Edison in 1885 and its current membership is comprised of senior level leaders of 165 utilities across North America and Asia. The organization's membership represents roughly 85% of the electric generating capacity in North America. The Committee is comprised of 30 senior managers representing member utilities across North America. In my capacity as Chair, I represented to Committee on the AEIC's Board of Directors.

In my capacity as a senior manager at PG&E, I often consulted with the utility's Executive Management on matters related to customer energy management and customer care.

As an officer at the international consulting firm Nexant Inc., I consulted with executive leaders at various utility clients throughout North America as well as being involved in the firm's business development and strategic planning.

- Strengthen ties with existing partners and bring on additional new partners to our mutual benefit


What more would you like us to know about your qualifications to serve on the Board?




















Paso Robles 2 Day Tour

My name is Doug Eakin, but my Porsche has a name too; its name is George. I named my car after my father for several reasons, but let me first describe my father.

Dad was a wonderful man. He was a lettered athlete in high school and was a tight end on the Lehigh football team. He obtained a BS in Civil Engineering from Lehigh while at the same time doing some part time work at Bethlehem Steel, being in a fraternity and later joining the Army ROTC. His strategy in joining the ROTC was so that he was less likely to get killed in the Korean War that was still hostile. After his Army stint, he was a civil engineer during the Eisenhower expansion of the highway system and then moved into a new field: database management on main frame computers.

My Dad was the real deal and was a very frugal man. He was also very practical in expenditures. Which is why when my big brother (who had a subscription to Road & Track magazine) brought up the topic of sports cars at the dinner table, Dad thought that was totally impractical. Why get an expensive sports car when you really can't make use of its' performance on the highway?

But my big brother put a bug into my brain about sports cars. And has time marched on, that interest crystalized into the notion of having a Porsche 911.

I have long viewed the Porsche 911 as the classic sports car. But as much as I marveled at them, I was too practical to buy one without financing it. I never owned any toys (motorcycles, boats, etc.), but I started saving for a Porsche 911.

Then this year my father's health started declining. Superman was fading fast. The last conversation I had with Dad was on my birthday, March 3rd. At this stage, my father could no longer speak, so I carried the whole conversation. I then explained how we had that dinner conversation about sports cars many years ago and he thought that was too impractical.

And then I told him that I was going to buy a sports car and name it after him. And his spirt would be driving along the Pacific Coast Highway in California. My father passed away three weeks later.

When the financial advisor explained the inheritance that I (and my siblings) would receive, I was stunned by how much Dad socked away. He was another example of a Depression Era child who had strong beliefs in saving money. I then announced to my siblings that I was going to take part of my inheritance and buy a Porsche. My brother was trying to dissuade me, but I decided to fulfill my dream and my promise to Dad.

This September, I spotted a listing in Rennslist that was exactly what I was looking for: a 2009 Silver 997.2 with manual transmission. After discussing the car with the owner, having him give me a ride and then having a pre purchase inspection, we struck a deal and I had my first sports car.

My father was an excellent father and George is an excellent car to commemorate Dad. When I touch George, I have a physical connection back to my father. As I said several times, Dad, thank you for everything.

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
